I hope you all enjoyed the long weekend. It perhaps might have been more enjoyable if it had been just a bit cooler. I didn't spend much time outside because I had a lot of math grading and planning to catch up on. The students have written about their special classes and activities and I will be including them in this newsletter. First here is an overview of this week's work. In math 4th and 5th grade students are working on operations, number theory, and math properties. Sixth and seventh graders will be working on greatest common factors and least common multiples and the order of operations. Eighth graders will continue to work on scientific notation and exponents with one student working on slope and rates.

In social studies, we will finish our *Jr Scholastic* tomorrow as well as a poster for jobs/chores. In science we will talk more about the phases of matter and start to talk about the gas laws.

In a combination of social studies and ELA, the students have started the books for their book groups. We will discuss what was assigned on Friday and add more assignments this week. Vocabulary words only number 15 this week since it is a short week, but some of them are a bit challenging. We will be writing and reading a lot this week as usual.

Students will also start working on their contribution to the CNS winter program that is scheduled for December 13. Much brainstorming will ensue this week to come up with some good options.

We have the math magic field trip scheduled on October 17 at the Carson Center in Paducah. We will be leaving the school between 9:30 and 10:00 that morning. Please bring a sack lunch and beverages as we will be eating at Bob Noble Park and the students will have some play time there after we eat. We will leave there between 1:30 and 2:00 to head back to

Carbondale to be back in time for our regular dismissal time. One of our drivers had to pull out of this trip so I am looking for another driver if at all possible. If not, we will still be able to go, but as you all know anyone sitting in the back seat of my car may be a little cramped, but we can manage. I am only thinking of the comfort of the kids. It a short trip though so they will be fine either way.

We have planned an additional field trip this month on October 31 to the Carbondale Community High School for a music concert. We will need to leave the school at 8:30 to get there, get parked, and get seated. We plan on leaving there at about 10:00 and returning to the school. Please let me know if you can help with transportation on this trip. In November we are going to look at structures at Castle Park in anticipation of building a castle at CNS. That trip is scheduled for November 14 from 11:45 until 2:45. Again, we will need drivers. This trip is a Wednesday, so we are having Primos deliver pizza to the park for the students' lunches.

The final field trip to mark on your 2018 calendars is in December. The entire school is going to a presentation about simple machines at Cedarhurst. For this we are leaving at 8:30 and returning sometime later that afternoon (depends on weather and drivers). We need drivers for this also.

Our muffin cooking class has been rescheduled for Monday 15. We will not need any materials for this unless someone wishes to loan us muffin pans to use for the day. We will be working not only on learning the muffin method for baked goods, but also converting measures and fractions.

1. **aa:** a type of lava that forms very rough rugged masses with a light frothy texture
(noun) (Bo)
2. **acousticophobia:** fear of noise; this can be fear of any noise or a specific noise
(noun) (Jasper)
3. **animancy:** The control of living things; the opposite of necromancy (noun) (Clare)
4. **apocalypse:** a prophetic revelation, especially concerning a cataclysm in which the forces of good permanently triumph over the forces of evil; the complete and final destruction of the world as described in the biblical book of revelation. (noun) (Anna)
5. **aquamancy:** divination through or manipulation of water (noun) (Clare)
6. **dent:** a slight hollow in a hard even surface made by a blow or by the exertion of pressure (noun) (Grayson)
7. **drought:** a prolonged period of abnormally low rainfall; a shortage of water resulting from this (noun) (Avree)
8. **espresso:** strong black coffee made by forcing steam through ground coffee beans (noun) (Ellie)
9. **Halloween:** the night of October 31, the eve of All Saints Day. This night is commonly celebrated by children who dress in costume and solicit candy or other treats door-to-door (noun) (Kloey)

18. **Middle Ages:** a period that lasted from about 500 to 1500 in Europe (noun)

19. **feudalism:** the system of obligations that governed the relationship between lords and vassals in medieval Europe (noun)

20. **Crusades:** a long series of wars between Christians and Muslims in Southwest Asia fought for control of the Holy Land from 1096 to 1291 (noun)
